The 2012 Report for Teacher Licensure Test Scores for the 2010-2011 year is based on Title II data and therefore reflects only initial licenses.

Initiative #1: Early Childhood Service Learning Initiative

Purpose: To provide service to local communities.

Goal: Engage in community service in the local (Oxford) community and in Over-the-Rhine Cincinnati at Rothenberg Preparatory Academy.

Number of Participants: 142

Strategy: Early Childhood students engage in a variety of service projects throughout the year. At Rothenberg Elementary in Cincinnati the social worker and principal identify needed projects. These have included providing baskets for homeless families containing food and blankets books for students and clothing for students to attend their 8th grade prom. Rothenberg has a student body of about 400 many of whom are homeless and poverty stricken. In addition to their focus on this community the students also engage in similar projects for the local community and international communities.

Demonstration of Impact: 70 baskets for 2012 surpassing 62 delivered in 2011 and 60 in 2010. A Miami University delivery truck is filled with these contributions and students take them to Rothenberg Elementary.

External Recognition: Miami is one of only five recipients in the nation to receive the 2012 Presidential Award for community service recognizing service programs in ECE.

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Pre-Service Teacher Survey Results

Description of Data: To gather information on student satisfaction with the quality of preparation provided by their teacher education programs, the Ohio Board of Regents and a committee of representatives from Ohio institutions of higher education collaborated to develop a survey of Ohio's Pre-Service Teachers as a special research project. Questions on the survey are aligned with the Ohio Standards for the Teaching Profession (OSTP), Ohio licensure requirements, and elements of national accreditation. The Ohio Board of Regents distributed the online survey to candidates completing their student teaching experiences in Fall 2012. The results below reflect the program average (mean) score for each question, as well as the state average for each question. A total of 1,917 respondents completed the survey statewide for a response rate of 76 percent. (Data Source: Ohio Board of Regents)
